WHAT UNDERMINES IT

B1

Mistrust of our neighbors

B2

Isolation: social, economic, and geographic

B3

Complexity is uncomfortable, inefficient, and expensive

B4

Scarcity mindset drives competition and over-emphasis on safety and risk mitigation, hoarding resources

B5

End-stage capitalism: privatized common goods like healthcare and housing, billionaires with no limits

B6

Fear of being “counter-cultural,” of what we may lose

B7

No activators or narrative-builders during emergencies or moments of mass attention

Few embodied ways of non-supremacy

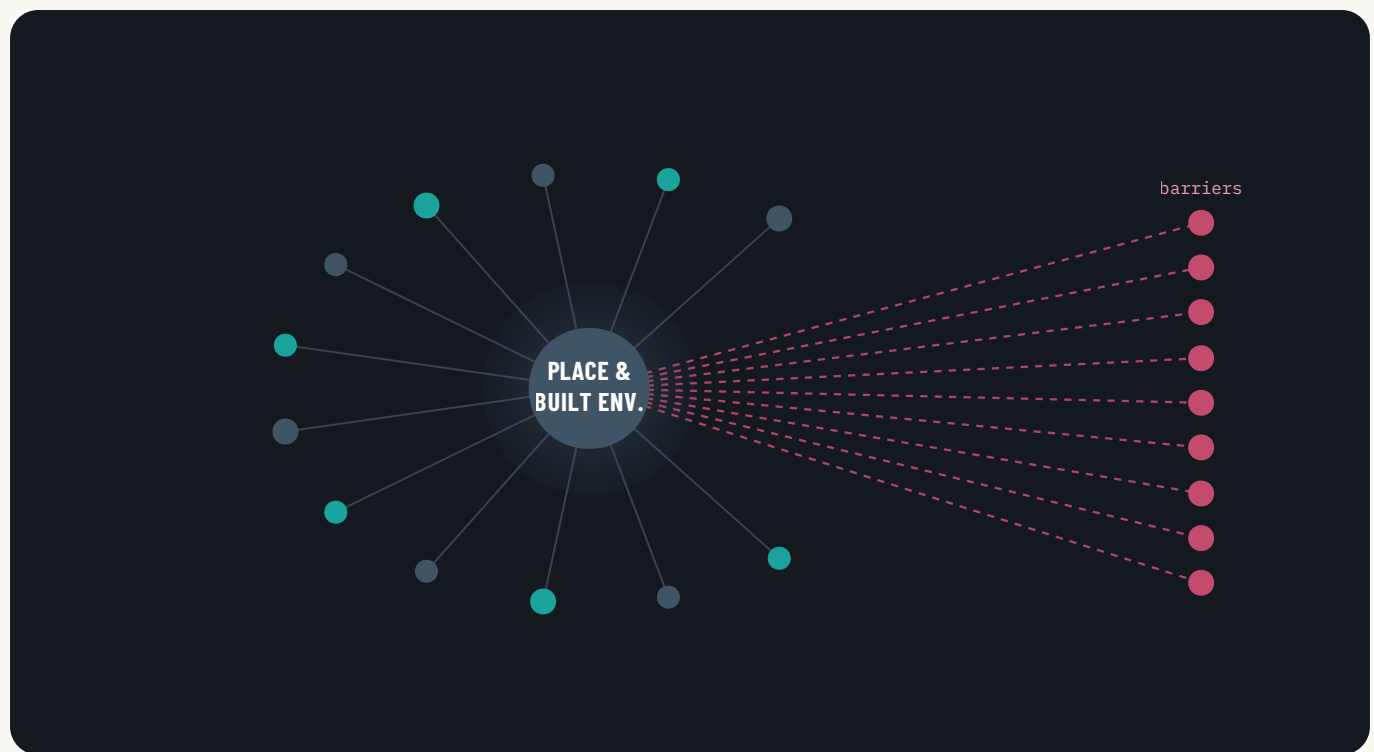

THE BOARD AT A GLANCE

AROUND THE COMPONENT

Place and the built environment at the center, the enabling conditions around it, and the barriers the group named set apart in rose. The five Activity 2 dimensions are the anchors these attach to.



OPEN, AND WORTH CARRYING FORWARD

THREADS

T1

THE DIMENSIONS CARRY FORWARD

Infrastructure, design and human scale, public space, housing, and nature are the anchors. No vote was visible on this board. Confirm in revision.

T2

BARRIER OR DRIVER

End-stage capitalism, scarcity, and isolation were placed in pink as barriers here, while a sister board placed capitalism as a green driver. Worth reconciling across boards.

T3

SHARED SEAM WITH STORY

This board shares a sheet with Story, Memory & Identity. The systemic notes near the seam, including Christian white nationalism, were a judgment call. David's transcription settles attribution.

T4

READING UNCERTAINTIES

A few notes were partly hidden, including the financial-training note. David's transcription settles the wording.
